Youth Learning and Engagement Vision

<u>Conceive</u> of every child as an individual *neshama* (soul), a unique individual and soul, and treat that child according to his or her particular needs, while affirming the ultimate importance of community;

<u>Create</u> an atmosphere of joyful, dynamic learning that touches the spirit as well as the mind of the learner; while encouraging family participation and creation of a kehillah kedoshah (holy community);

<u>Commit</u> to excellence and consistency in curriculum, teaching, and imparting information regarding our Jewish people's history, literature, spirituality, culture, values, and ethics, incorporating these Jewish ideals into our everyday lives;

<u>Challenge</u> our clergy, staff, faculty, students, and parents to live according to the highest values of our people --to treat one another ethically, responsibly, sensitively, respectfully, and fairly;

<u>Create</u> young Jewish people who will leave our Temple imbued with a joyful and deep understanding of their Jewish identity; and who will be forever committed to living a joyous and meaningful Jewish life wherever their life-paths take them;

<u>Create</u> a partnership between the Early Childhood Education Center and the Religious School so that the transition from one stage of learning to another fosters continuity.

Youth Learning and Engagement Committee

This committee partners with the clergy and the education team to examine and enhance our current offerings for youth learning and engagement. Together we ensure the implementation of our vision for Jewish education, Kgn-12th grade, supporting the work of the school and youth groups.

Committee responsibilities may include: strategic planning and the transformation of our learning environment, curriculum development, family programming and involvement, social action, event planning, and fundraising.

Weekly Religious School Schedule, Curricular Goals, and Program Opportunities *Ma'ayan* for students with disabilities

Meets Sunday mornings 8:45-10:45 AM, approximately twice a month.

- Classes for children with disabilities taught by a Jewish certified special education teacher.
- Each *Ma'ayan* student is paired with a teen to assist them inside and outside the classroom.
- Curriculum: An introduction to Jewish holidays, traditions, history, prayers, and the Hebrew language.
- Students participate in *Tefillah* services and *Shirah* (music) each time they meet.

Kindergarten through 2nd Grade

Kgn-2nd Grades will meet on Sunday mornings with both in-person and online options available for families to choose at their comfort. In person classes will be at maximum 10 students per class. In the event your child is unable to attend in-person learning (for health or other reasons), virtual learning will be available on a weekly basis.

Kgn & 1st Grade Judaics Curriculum: Focuses on discovering holidays, exploring our Temple, and our very first Torah stories

2nd Grade Judaics Curriculum: A deep dive into the Jewish holidays, an exploration of our own Jewish identities, and values

Kgn-2nd Grades Hebrew & Tefillah:

- Hebrew Curriculum: Hebrew Through Movement, Me and My Family, Classroom Hebrew and pre-reading skills.
- Tefillah (prayer) Curriculum: Prayer readiness, songs of welcome and blessing. Barchu, Shema, Oseh Shalom. Students participate in Tefillah (prayer) services and Shirah (music) every Sunday.

3rd Grade

3rd Grade will meet on Sunday mornings with both in-person and online options available for families to choose at their comfort. In person classes will be at maximum 10 students per class. In the event your child is unable to attend in-person learning (for health or other reasons), virtual learning will be available on a weekly basis.

NEW THIS YEAR: Families with children in 3rd Grade may elect an additional mid-week in person or virtual (by family preference) Hebrew pod at no additional cost. Each pod is 45 minutes long, no more than 6 children to a pod, designed to continue Aleph-Bet learning and support Hebrew Decoding.

- Judaics Curriculum: *Torah* Stories: Creation to the Exodus, Holidays
- Hebrew Curriculum: *Alef Bet*: The Hebrew Alphabet
- Tefillah (prayer) Curriculum: Same as Kgn-2nd grade plus Yotzer Or, Mi Chamocha, Amidah, Sh'aila Sh'Kaita (the silent question). Students participate in Tefillah (prayer) services and Shirah (music) every Sunday.

Youth Group: Extreme Yeladim for 3rd and 4th graders

4th Grade & 5th Grade

4th and 5th Grades will meet on Sunday mornings, virtually, from 8:45-10:45 AM, plus one 45 minute pod of Hebrew, either Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday in one of the time slots per day (details on midweek below).

Midweek Classes

Hebrew pods will meet midweek in person or virtually, by family preference. Pods are maximally 6 students. This will allow intense focus and personal attention to take place.

4th Grade Curriculum

6th Grade

6th Grade *Nisayon* (experience)

Our 6th Grade program is called *Nisayon*. *Nisayon* means experience and this year will be a year of fun, immersive Jewish experiences for your 6th grader and your entire family!

6th grade is divided into 3 core components.

Hebrew

Hebrew instruction will take place in person or virtually (by family preference) during 45 minute Hebrew pod rotations of class sizes no larger than 6 children. Hebrew instruction will continue to focus on reading and prayer skills.

Individual prayer lessons in preparation for bar and bat mitzvah readiness will begin approximately 4-6 months prior to your child's date, and are coordinated by our clergy's administrative staff. These lessons are in addition to, not in lieu of, your child's classroom learning. Our 6th Grade Judaic studies will take place online, on Wednesdays from 6:30-7:45 PM.

To create one unified 6th grade community, students will learn Judaics from our 6th grade team of teachers.

The themes of Middot (Jewish Virtues and Ethics), Shoah (Holocaust Studies), and Comparative Religion, will frame a year of edu-tainment, with an emphasis on K'lal Yisrael (Jewish people-hood and comparative Judaism) and Eretz Yisrael (the Land of Israel).

PLUS MONTHLY NISAYON EXPERIENCES (dates and programs in the Registration Materials)

A schedule of monthly programs and Shabbat experiences complement the core curriculum. This creates a sacred community of learners in which our children develop their own sense of Jewish identity building a connection with Jewish ritual and practice. Some programs are for 6th grade students only and others offer a family the opportunity to learn and celebrate together. Families are expected to choose 6 or more of these programs that meet your family's interests and needs, based on the content and schedule. The schedule of events will be available at the time of registration. Experiences in the fall are online, with hopes for in-person experiences as the year progresses. Our Supplementary Registration Form will offer an update of program dates/times previously presented in the spring.

Youth Group: Extreme Bonim for 5th and 6th graders

7th Grade

Meets <u>online</u> Tuesday nights from 7:30-8:45 PM, with hopes for in-person experiences as the year progresses. The curriculum focuses on viewing the adolescent's world through a Jewish lens - Our Jewish Stories, Our Jewish Lives, and our Jewish Values.

Students pre-b'nai mitzvah who want to keep their prayers fresh, may elect to join a Hebrew pod at no additional cost.

Mitzvah Corps The Mitzvah Corps program is a program designed to look at Social Action through a Jewish lens. Throughout the year participants will volunteer together, learn about why, as Jewish Teens, they have the responsibility to make the world a better place, and how to donate money in a Jewish way.

Currently, Mitzvah Corps is on hold until circumstances change, and is subject to JFS decisions. If we are able to restart Mitzvah Corps, we will do so, and charge at that point on a prorated basis. If you have already been billed, we will refund that charge or apply it to other Temple activities at your choice.

10th Grade

Madrichim program

Students in 8th-12th Grades apply to serve as role models and teaching assistants on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, or Sundays in the younger grades of our programming. Based on parent comfort, they may be madrichim either in person or virtually. Madrichim assignments will include individual student support, small group support, classroom support, technology assistant, tefillah engagement squad, office support, photography and publicity, community building, and limited teaching responsibilities for experienced madrichim.

A close examination of the student's Jewish identity, exploring topics of God, sexuality, justice and spirituality. Social Action projects, which continue to be a priority for our Confirmation Class, will happen as health and safety permit.

Religious School Attendance Expectations

"The day is short; the work is plentiful." (Pirke Avot)

We look forward to seeing each student at every session. Class attendance is a vital element to learning and creating a sense of community. Students who do not attend regularly will have difficulty keeping up with the curriculum and the social component. We expect 70% attendance from all participants. Please help us by:

- a. Notifying the YLE School office in advance if you anticipate an absence,
- b. Notifying the <u>YLE School</u> office as soon as possible if any unanticipated absence, such as an illness, occurs.

Our Judaics lessons are interactive and experiential. Therefore, it is difficult to provide alternative activities for students to learn the content in the event of an absence. We will do our best to provide resources and information on the missed content so that your child can become familiar with the Judaics content that is taught in his or her absence. Students will be expected to practice between class sessions and keep up with missed lessons in the event of an absence, using our Online Learning Center or the Temple website. In the event that your child is feeling unwell, please stay home and make use of our online learning and virtual classrooms whenever available (details in our Covid-19 Supplement)

Drop-off/pick-up and early dismissal

While we realize that there may be times when it is necessary for your child to arrive late, or to leave early, please understand that this can be disruptive for the rest of the class. Whenever possible, please try to make other arrangements. Our online learning options are always available to you.

If your child must arrive late, there is a ten minute grace period during which our classes are starting. If you will be more than 10 minutes late, you **must** call the YLE office upon arrival and someone will greet you to do our Covid-19 entry check. (908)232-6772

If your child must leave early, we ask that you send a note to the teacher indicating the time that you will be picking up your child. Please park your car and call the School Office (908) 232-6772, to sign your child out. Then a member of our staff will escort your child from the classroom outside to meet you. For reasons of health, we cannot permit adults to enter the building.

Books and Materials For YLE

Students will be provided with textbooks, resources and materials for their use and are brought home at the end of the year to help your child to build a personal library of Jewish resources.

Individual teachers may have specific supply requests, i.e. spiral notebooks for journaling, etc. Your child's teacher will be in touch with you directly if there are specific supplies needed for a class.

Home Practice Expectations

In 3rd-6th grade, there will be Hebrew home practice assigned after each session. As is the case with learning any new skill, successful Hebrew learning requires regular practice. In order to maximize the students' learning experience, we offer the following guidelines regarding home practice:

- Studies indicate that brief and frequent review is most effective in leading to success with language learning. Students in 3rd-7th grade should spend at least 15 minutes, 3-4 times per week, on their Hebrew studies. Hebrew home practice for 3rd -6th graders will involve using a computer to access the Behrman House Online Learning Center or Temple website.
- Attendance with your child at Friday night or Saturday morning services will also go a long way in reinforcing what your child is learning, as well as put it into context and practice.

Even if you cannot read Hebrew, you can still listen to your child read and give encouragement. You can even ask your child to help you learn to read Hebrew. All recordings of our blessings and prayers are on the Temple website as are copies to download of the prayers.

Inclusion

Temple Emanu-El is proud to host the *Ma'ayan* program for children with disabilities. More information about *Ma'ayan* can be found in the section, **Weekly Religious School Schedule,Curricular Goals, and Program Opportunities.**

We also strive to create an inclusive learning environment within our mainstream YLE School classrooms. In class and/or pull-out support as well as replacement instruction is available to our students who have disabilities. *Madrichim*, teen teaching assistants, serve as one-on-one support as needed for individual students and our Inclusion Coordinator will work with parents to provide modified instruction whenever possible. If we are unable to meet the needs of an

individual student within the mainstream classroom, our Coordinator will work with parents to determine if *Ma'ayan* placement will better meet the needs of your child.

Food Allergies

Presently, no food will be served or allowed at YLE activities to encourage mask wearing and help prevent the spread of Covid-19. When that changes, please be aware of the following.

Some of our students have life-threatening food allergies. There is an opportunity for parents to communicate this information during the registration process. We will strive to keep each child safe by aiming to eliminate all nuts from our school. We cannot completely guarantee a nut-free environment since other activities and programs occur at Temple Emanu-El outside of school hours. We will, however, maintain a nut aware environment in our classrooms during school hours. Food provided to students by the school will not contain peanuts or tree nuts. Parents will be notified in advance if food will be served during a class or grade-level program. Parents are welcome to provide an alternate, safe food for any program involving food so that a child with an allergy may fully participate. Communication between home and school is essential for the safety of all of our students. We request that any food sent to school to be shared with other students also be peanut and tree nut free.

Please note: TEWTY (our senior youth group) manages a snack and drink vending machine outside of the Community Room. The foods in this vending machine may contain allergens. Please speak with your child about food allergy safety if you wish to provide money for your child to buy a snack from the machine. Currently, the snack and drink vending machines will not be available for use.

Lost and Found

Any items left behind during school hours are kept in the school office. Feel free call us and we will search for your missing item.

Attire

We uphold the Jewish value of *tzniut*, modesty. Please follow your secular school's dress code when attending Youth Learning and Engagement or youth group events. Cleats are not permitted.

When students are asked to participate in Friday night or Saturday morning *Shabbat* services on the *bimah* we ask that they dress appropriately. This includes slacks or fingertip length skirts or dresses. Jeans, shorts, t-shirts, sweatshirts and flip-flops are not appropriate attire on the *bimah*. All students are invited and encouraged to wear kippot.

Handheld Electronic Devices

From time to time, our faculty utilizes electronic devices or other technology as part of their lesson planning. Students may even be invited to use their personal devices to enhance a lesson or activity. The use of electronic devices, such as cell phones, iPods, and video game players is not permitted during the hours of YLE, **unless specifically directed by faculty**. Students are encouraged to keep video game devices at home. If students choose to bring an electronic device to the Temple, the power switch on the device must be turned "off" when students arrive in class. These devices may not be turned "on" until school is over or unless specifically directed by faculty. If a student does not follow this policy, the device will be held by the teacher and returned at the end of class. If a device needs to be taken from a student a second time, the device will be returned at dismissal to the adult picking up the student. If a

medical exception to this policy is necessary, we ask that the family contact the School office and inform the classroom teacher in advance so that we may maintain the students' privacy during class time.

Family Programs

Your participation enriches your child's Youth Learning and Engagement experience and can be rewarding for your family as well. Family programs are included in several of our elementary school grades. These programs will take place on Sunday mornings during YLE School hours, 8:45-10:45 AM, and are designed as an opportunity for our students and parents to learn together as well as for class families to get to know one another.

Tefillah (Prayer) during Religious School

Kgn-5th Graders will participate in age-appropriate and interactive *Tefillah* services every Sunday led by our clergy.

6th Graders will participate in a *Tefillah* service on Wednesday nights led by our teen song leaders and education staff.

All students are invited to wear *kippot* (skullcaps) during services. We encourage students to bring in a *kippah* from home and keep it in their backpack. No sharing of kippot is allowed. The Temple will provide a kippah on request, which then belongs to the child.

Please note: at the current time, all tefillah will be virtual.

Tzedakah

One of the many *mitzvot* (commandments) we are commanded to fulfill is *tzedakah*. *Tzedakah* means "justice" and it is the collection of money that we regard as an important Jewish obligation to the community. Our school has had the privilege of sending donations to many different organizations. We encourage each child and their family to contribute to the school's *tzedakah* fund through their own motivation and resources. We collect *tzedakah* on all days when school is in session.

Parents of Kgn-6th grade students will receive periodic emails from the YLE. This email may include what was recently covered in class and online practice assignments to be completed at home. It may also include a special recognition of your child's recent accomplishments.

This is a closed group, therefore your request to join must be approved by our administration and anything that is posted remains private to the group.

Emergency Closings

In the event of an emergency school closing for weather related or other reasons, an automated phone call will be made to the phone number you provided on your registration. You can also learn about emergency closings by visiting the Temple website or calling 908-232-6770, press 6. Any last minute decisions regarding closing of the YLE will also be communicated via email through our Constant Contact groups.

Shabbat Worship

At Temple Emanu-El, we want our students to be comfortable at services and increase their appreciation for meaningful worship. As part of our YLE Education program, students are expected to attend *Shabbat* worship services either on a Friday night or a Saturday morning. Attending services helps to reinforce the prayer curriculum in our school by allowing the children to practice what they are learning, as well as providing an opportunity for students to join in as part of our Jewish community. 
Parent Learning Opportunities

COVID-19 Supplemental Addendum

Temple Emanu-El's Youth Learning and Engagement (YLE) programs act in compliance with best practice regarding the health and safety of all participants, families, faculty, and staff. All COVID-19 related policies are based on recommendations from the Center for Disease Control (CDC), and our local Westfield Department of Health (DOH). We will continually adjust our program's policies and procedures to align with the current guidance from these agencies. Updates to our policies will be provided to families via email from the YLE. We require that all families and staff follow state and local regulations related to COVID-19. This includes but is not limited to quarantine requirements stemming from family travel and any other ordinances.

Class Pods

Teachers and *madrichim* will be assigned to and remain with their class pod for the entirety of the school day. There will be a maximum of 10 children and 3 adults per physical class space. Children and staff will not interact physically with any other class pod. Any floating specialists (music, Hebrew through Movement, *tefillah*) will offer their classes in a digital framework, even if the children are meeting in person. Indoor and outdoor learning spaces will be occupied by one class pod at a time, with cleaning and sanitizing procedures in place between groups.

Modifications to In-Person Learning

Classes will be encouraged and permitted to work outside when the weather permits. Learning experiences may take place in TEVA as well as other designated outdoor spaces, covered with pop-up tents when needed. When working inside, maintaining good airflow will be encouraged. Please send your child dressed for the possibility of being outdoors.

Children will be provided with individualized supplies as much as possible (eg: their own playdoh, crayons, markers, etc). Sharing of supplies will be strictly limited. Shared or collectively stored items will be properly cleaned and sanitized between uses. No communal fidgets can be provided this year - families may send a personal fidget for their child's own use. If you would like that fidget to be stored in the building, it must be clearly labelled and in a plastic bag.

Close person to person contact will be limited as much as possible. Table seating will be spread out, and children will be required to keep a 6-foot social distance from each other.

All staff members and students are required to wear face masks during the school day. Masks must be worn at all times indoors and also worn outdoors in situations where it is difficult to maintain a social distance of 6 feet from others. Masks should: fit snugly but comfortably against the side of the face; allow for breathing without restriction; be able to be laundered and machine-dried without damage. If wearing a mask is not manageable, we will ask that you make use of our distance learning options.

Arrival and Dismissal

Parents, visitors, vendors, and prospective parents or employees will not be allowed to enter the building during operating hours, unless for emergencies. We will be instituting car lines for drop off and pick up. In some cases, instead of a car line, teachers may bring the children to designated parking spaces in the parking lot and will release the child to their designated pick up person.

Drop off Procedures

- Prior to arriving at the building each day, you will be required to fill out an on-line health screening form.
- All members in the car over the age of 2 MUST be wearing masks
- The driver of the car will roll down the window where the child/ren are located
- A temple "screener" will be dressed in proper PPE with a mask, and gloves
- The "screener" will perform a temperature check for each student using an infrared, no touch thermometer and then ask the parent/caregiver a list of required questions (see below)
- If child/ren are approved to enter school: they will proceed to their classroom, disinfecting hands along the way. In the case of young children, an escort will be available.

For Sunday pickup, or other crowded pick-up times as announced, no parents may enter the building. A staffer with a walkie will be at the carpool line. Parents will roll down the window to give their carpool number, or otherwise clearly display their child's name and carpool number. The child will come out to the car. In the case of young children, an escort will be provided.

Health Screenings and Temperature Checks

All children and staff will be screened daily prior to being admitted into the building. Parents MUST keep their child home if they exhibit any signs of illness and if they are sick or not feeling well. The screening will be for the following symptoms and families must provide their responses honestly with regards to not only their child but for every member of their family. If one child or family member exhibits any of the symptoms, then that child and his/her siblings will not be allowed to enter the building.

- If anyone in the household has been in close contact with someone that has been positively diagnosed with COVID-19 within the last 14 days
- If the child has received any fever reducing medication
- Fever of 100.4 or above
- Cough
- Shortness of breath/difficulty breathing
- Headache, muscle pain, chills, repeated shaking with chills, new loss of taste or smell

If Symptoms are Exhibited

If a student or employee develops COVID-19 symptoms while at school, they will immediately be moved to an isolated room. Parents/caregivers will be notified to pick up the student immediately and upon arrival, the student will be escorted to the family's vehicle. Employees will go home immediately.

Parents and sick employees should seek medical advice within 48 hours and schedule a COVID-19 test as needed. Students and employees who exhibit symptoms cannot return to school until they provide documentation from a medical provider indicating testing was negative and there are no other restrictions. Even if the test is negative, the student or employee must be free of ALL symptoms for a minimum of 72 hours before returning to school. If the test result is positive, individuals must complete a period of isolation as directed by their doctor and the health authorities. The YLE will follow direction from local health authorities on contact tracing and quarantining, which may include requiring that the student's entire class (including teachers and madrichim) also quarantine for 14 days.

If a student has been in known close contact with a person who has tested positive for COVID-19 (e.g. a parent, caregiver, playmate, or sibling), they must self-quarantine for 14 days and immediately inform the school. The student's class will not be required to quarantine if it is not necessary.

If a student or a member of their family develops COVID-19, their entire class will be under quarantine for 14 days and those students will receive Distance Learning during this time. The infected student's siblings will also be required to quarantine for 14 days, however that sibling's class will not be under quarantine, unless it is necessary. The YLE follows direction from authorities on contact tracing and quarantining and as a result, requirements may change.

We respectfully ask for parents and caregivers to **be prepared for children to be sent home** for illnesses and symptoms that, in previous years, would be considered minor (e.g., colds or allergies). If a child is absent for a class for any reason, we will offer opportunities for them to engage in on-line learning by opting into our online options for the duration of the illness.

Food

In order to minimize food handling by staff, and maximize mask wearing, the school will not provide any food for your child this year. Given the limited time in which our students will be together, we also ask that you not send food or drink with your child unless there is a legitimate medical need.

Travel Out of State

Staff members or families that travel out of state must comply with NJ State self quarantine mandates. It is expected that parents traveling out of state for work or pleasure to a state that is on NJ's Travel Advisory list will quarantine in their home for 14 days, remaining socially distant from their children that attend our program. If they are unable to remain socially distant, then their children must also quarantine for 14 days. The family is required to inform the school if they travel to a state that is on NJ's Travel Advisory list.
