From the Desk of Rabbi Prosnit

I shared these words at the beginning of the Congregational Meeting:

One of my favorite parts of being a rabbi is bestowing the Priestly Blessing. It is a familiar three line prayer found in the Torah Portion Naso. Adonai spoke to Moses. Speak to Aaron and his sons: Thus shall you bless the people of Israel. Say to them:

May God bless you and protect you! May God's face shine upon you and be gracious to you! May God bestow favor upon you and grant you peace!

As we recap the year, I reflect on the many times that I said this blessing. Here are some of my highlights...

- I offered the priestly blessing to over 30 B'nai Mitzvah students as their parents stood behind them beaming with pride.
- I whispered the blessing to 34 Confirmands, one of the largest Confirmation classes in the entire Reform Movement, as they led our congregation beautifully in prayer.
- Each month we concluded our Shabbat B'yachad Family Services, which saw a significant increase in participation this year, with this same benediction.
- I recited these words as I gave babies their Hebrew names, including my own, born on Yom Kippur.
- I offered these words to our Kindergartners at Teva, our graduating seniors on the bima, to wedding couples standing under the chuppah, and to individuals who have chosen Judaism at the mikvah.
- On a Shabbat in May, we said goodbye with the priestly blessing to our student rabbi, now Rabbi Hilly Haber, who brought her insight, her warmth, and her creativity to our community.
- And we blessed two congregants, Ben Bass and Dory Baron, who are making Aliyah this summer.

It was a packed year of blessing and I look forward to this upcoming year as we will have opportunities for continued blessings.

March for Love

Temple Emanu-El and the Tikkun Olam Committee sponsored a march to show our commitment to Love and Against Hate. The march was held in the evening on May 1st. We marched from town hall to the Temple sanctuary. People brought signs as we walked through a closed Broad Street, joined by members of the Westfield interfaith clergy, Westfield's Mayor Shelley Brindle, Senator Tom Kean, Jr, Assemblyman Jon M. Bramnick and members of the Dr. Martin Luther King Jr Association of Westfield, as well as local reporters and members of the greater community. We are incredibly thankful to Chief Battiloro and the entire Westfield police department for their support in planning and executing this community event. Speakers for the rally which took place in our sanctuary included Mayor

Help Feed the Hungry

Is this not the fast I look for: Is it not to share your bread with the hungry? - *Isaiah*.

Each year during the High Holydays, our Temple family collects hundreds of pounds of food for donation to the Westfield Food Pantry. Please join us again this year as we continue our efforts to help feed hungry families in our larger community.

As in the past, empty grocery bags will be distributed to congregants after Rosh Hashanah services. We ask that you return the bags filled with nonperishable food items on Yom Kippur morning, October 9. Volunteers from the Westfield Food Pantry will be stationed in both parking lots (at Temple Emanu-El and the First Congregational Church) to assist with the collection. The following items are greatly needed: canned foods such as tuna, beans, soup, fruit, vegetables, chili, and nutritional supplements for the elderly; boxed foods such as rice, pasta, cereal, pancake mix, and instant potatoes; and peanut butter and jelly.

Planned Giving Opportunities

Bequests. Codicil. Residuum?

Those words aren't typos, they are real terms used in legacy giving. There's a lot of jargon out there surrounding charitable donations - let us help to demystify it!

...a bequest is the most common planned gift, but there are other options as well? Some of those options are a charitable gift annuity, charitable remainder trust or life insurance policies. Consider giving a gift to Temple Emanu-El that will live on through the years.

Contact Brian Chartock for more information or details on how Planned Giving can fit into your plans. We will try our best to answer all of your planned giving questions.

If you are 70 1/2 or older, you can still use your IRA for charitable contributions during your lifetime. Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD) have distinct tax advantages. A QCD is not treated as taxable income; therefore, it has no effect on taxable income. This allows for greater amounts to be transferred to charities tax-free and can help the donor avoid the aforementioned negative financial consequences.

High Holyday Ticket Information

Please note the following policies concerning High Holyday tickets:

- At Temple Emanu-El services, every attendee, including children of any age (infant through college), will need a ticket. Everyone high school aged through adult needs a photo ID with their ticket.
- At Kol Haneshamah services, tickets must be issued for attendees of all ages. One parking permit per family per Holyday will be issued as well.
- ☆ Your tickets will be delivered via email same as last year. You can print out the email to show at the door, or you can show the ticket (email) on your smartphone. If you do not have an email address you may come into the Temple and pick up your ticket or it will be held for you at the door.
- ☆ Please have your tickets and ID available prior to reaching the door to save time.
- ⇐ Congregants with tickets and photo ID in hand may enter as directed by the ushers.
- Congregants without tickets or without a photo ID will be directed to a table where their membership can be confirmed.

Please note the following information:

- Tickets will be issued at no cost to members who are current with their Temple financial obligations and who have sent in their ticket order form (or filled them out online). Order forms for your ticket(s) and additional guest tickets were mailed in June and can be found on our website.
- ☆ Guest tickets for adult children attending either Rosh Hashanah or Yom Kippur services, but not both, cost \$90 per ticket.
- Guest tickets for adult children attending both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services and all other guests, whether attending services for Rosh Hashanah only, or Yom Kippur only, or both cost \$180 per ticket. You can mail your check with your form or pay online through Chaverweb!
- There is no charge for anyone 26 and under. Tickets are required for all attendees. Please remember that Temple Emanu-El participates in the URJ reciprocity program. All members in good standing at another congregation may receive tickets for free. Simply have their temple let us know that they will be attending! Still include them on your Guest Ticket order form and jot down "recip" next to their name(s).
- \Rightarrow Please do not ask for exceptions to these rules.
- ☆ Tickets will be emailed approximately 2 weeks prior to Rosh Hashanah. Do not delete the email that contains your electronic ticket.

Photo ID required with ticket.

If you or any family member or guest do not carry items on the Holydays, call the Temple Emanu-El office and let us know.

High Holyday Decorum

- \Rightarrow For safety's sake, strollers are not permitted in the Sanctuary due to fire regulations.
- ☆ Please respect the dignity of the service, and refrain from leaving your seat during the sermon or at any time when the Holy Ark is open.
- If your child becomes restless during the service, please take him or her to a more suitable area.
- ☆ Seats may be saved up to 10 minutes before services begin.
- ☆ Please be on time taking seats after services have started is disruptive to those in the area.
- \Rightarrow In deference to those with allergies, please refrain from using heavy fragrances.

This unique worship experience is open to attendees of all ages, though it is designed as a prayer option for those families with K-7 students. Services will be led by our new Student Rabbi and a songleader, along with appearances from our own TEE Clergy. This interactive and intergenerational service includes a youth-oriented prayer book, guitar accompaniment, as well as stories and meaningful discussion. A Small Memoir from a Plane Destined for New Jersey

In this airplane, it's quiet for a bit. My headphones have fallen out somewhere in the hood of my sweatshirt and I have woken up with a stiff neck and sore heart. It is July 26th and has been for about 27 hours. I will be arriving home soon to the bustle of Newark Airport and my five weeks in Israel will no longer be a tomorrow, but a yesterday. I close my eyes, with nothing to do, and allow memories to come.

I was in the Negev, July 3rd. The sun beat, as it did daily, burning my shoulders and coaxing the freckles to dance across my face. My hat shielded some of the brightness from my eyes, but the wind had gotten the best of the flimsy thing causing it to, in an abrupt gust of wind, tumble down to the ground below. It was day three in the desert and my greasy hair, lack of sleep, and ache in my back were enough to inform me that I couldn't do this another day. That was fine, however, because this hike was our last. My hand was grabbed and I was hoisted up a steep section of the mountain. People were behind me, people were in front of me, but nobody was in a hurry. This was desert time, endless time, boil you alive time. We reached a peak and sat, drinking in the empty landscape and what was left of our water. "Look around" our guide announced. "From this point you can see three nations. Look ahead of you. Behind those mountains is Jordan. Look to the right of you. Behind that fence is Egypt. And we are in Israel." He says this casually, as if seeing these nations all at once was an occurrence not to be marveled at. I felt impossibly small. We hiked down that mountain shortly after, my well-worn shoes begging for some rest. On the way down, we spoke of dinner that night, who would ride in the big bus, and who in the van, and questioned where we would lay down our sleeping bag for the brief hours of sleep ahead of us, desperate for a shower and some chapstick. And we went to bed, an infinite amount of stars above. I counted six shooting stars that night. We did not get much sleep.

Kulanu High Holyday Service

Last year during the High Holydays, we piloted a new prayer service called Kulanu, meaning "all of us". This unique worship experience was designed as a prayer option for those families with K-7 students. At Kulanu, we intended kids and adults to share a time of connection, celebration, and awe. This year our staff, along with our Task Force for Diversity and Inclusion, created a special Shabbat service dedicated to celebrating the diversity of our congregation and exploring what it means to be an inclusive community. This meant incorporating a visual supplement to our regular Shabbat



prayers, using alternative language, and having modifications and tools readily available for individuals with a disability to better enjoy and participate in the worship. We were also very lucky to welcome special guest, author and disability advocate Gabrielle Kaplan-Mayer. Along with speaking to us during services, she facilitated a wonderful program following services where members young and old shared artistic representations of the gifts that they bring to our community. A Small Memoir from a Plane Destined for **New Jersev**

The desert had a way of shaping Israel for me, bringing it beyond the prayers in synagogue and the "one days" in camp. Fewer than twenty-four hours after the plane had found Earth at Ben Gurion Airport, my closest friends and I found ourselves waking up to a sky painted with deep reds, vellows, oranges, and promises. That sun stretched over the ice cream dripping down our hands, baked the Dead Sea mud on our backs, glistened on the surface of the Red Sea, and peered through spaces in the roof at Shuk HaCarmel. It rose again and again at Masada, Jerusalem, Eilat, Tel Aviv. Each picture, each small trinket, each grain of sand between my toes was under this sun, the same desert sun with different faces.

I know how lucky I am to have been able to go to Israel. While I was fortunate enough to grow up in an accepting community with a relatively large Jewish population, camp and Israel were where most of my identity as a Jewish person stemmed from. It was at camp where Judaism took root into my soul, beginning as a small seed in 4th grade and branching out into an oak tree in Israel. The desert sun helped foster that growth. I learned the friendship of being Jewish, the community of being Jewish, the arms-aroundyou-and-swaying side of being Jewish. I walked around and my heart would swell because these people around me, although we were vastly different, shared a common history. Our stories may not have been in the same sentence, but they were on the same page.

l open my eyes on the plane now, the city landscape beneath me and my friends beside me. I glance at the slight sunburn on my arm, a remembrance of the weeks before, and clutch the Star of David around my neck.

And I was okay.
