THE TEE TABLET A "GEM" OF A PUBLICATION

We are all familiar with the traditional depiction of the tablets that Moses carried down from Mount Sinai, the two stones rounded at top with letters inscribed on one side. Yet, if we dig deeper into our ancient texts we might be surprised with another depiction of what these tablets looked like.

We read in Exodus that Moses went up the mountain and saw that under God's feet was pavement that looked like lapis lazuli, as bright blue as the sky. One verse later we read, "Adonai said to Moses, 'Come up to me on the mountain and stay here, and I will give you the tablets of stone with the law and commandments I have written for their instruction." (Exodus 24:12)

Many rabbinic commentators look at these verses together and conclude that actually the tablets were not carved on grey stones but instead were taken from God's throne and were made of lapis lazuli or sapphires, blue stones as bright as the sky. Perhaps the movies and the paintings get it all wrong; they should depict Moses with bright blue tablets walking down Mount Sinai. The commandments from God were not just written on any ordinary stone but instead created with a precious stone or hidden gems, making the words from God even more special. With this interpretation, we have a new way to look at one of our most ancient symbols.

And we too now have a new way to look at one of our own ancient Temple texts; our Temple Bulletin is getting a refresh!

Welcome to "The TEE Tablet" a quarterly publication from our synagogue family. After two years like no other we felt that it was the perfect time to revision our bulletin. No longer will the bulletin be only about upcoming events and programs but we hope that it will highlight our sacred community. We want it to be a publication where you learn about fellow Temple members, staff and clergy. We want it to be a publication where you gain new insights into your Judaism, find new ways to practice a holiday, or where you can check out a new recipe or song. We want it to be a place where our congregants can share poetry, stories and/or artwork. The TEE Tablet is about our community and we can't wait to highlight all of our voices – that will truly make it a precious tablet.

We believe that it is a fitting name that represents our past texts but also looks towards the future. While The TEE Tablet won't be written on sapphires or lapis lazuli, we hope that you will find some hidden gems in it!

What was it like growing up at Temple Emanu-El?

It was an unbelievable experience to witness a real survivor and a Jewish icon. Of course my bat mitzvah was another incredible memory too!

Why did you decide to join the Temple in your adult life? How long have you been a member?

When I got engaged I was living in Manhattan while my finance was living in NJ. We were trying to figure out where to live and we decided to move to Westfield because I knew I wanted to come back to the area where I grew up and join Temple Emanu-El. It was something that was always important to me. We got married in November 2010 and moved to Mountainside in 2011. We've been members for ten and a half years.

What is your involvement at the Temple?

There are three areas where I'm really involved. The first is that I am on the board. My position is the Recording and Corresponding Secretary. The second is through Sisterhood as the Membership Vice President. The third is through my volunteer work in the office.

What is your favorite Jewish holiday?

Probably Rosh Hashanah. I like the fact that it's the Jewish new year and we can mark new beginnings. It is the time where everyone can come together and be with family.

What is your favorite Jewish food?

Latkes - definitely latkes.

Are you watching anything good on Netflix?

I'm watching You. I also love Succession on HBO. It's awesome.

Favorite local restaurant?

Cosimos in Westfield.

What's one thing you want people to know about the impact that the Temple has made on your life?

I want people to know that it is a very special place. It's a place where I found out who I was and what kind of Jew I was. I'm so proud to be part of this community.

OUTH LEAKNING & SINGAGEMENT'S HAMAKO

HaMakom is Union County's Jewish community 8-12th grade program and part of Temple Emanu-El's Youth Learning and Engagement. Together, we share in worship, education, social action, and cultural activities.

Temple Emanu-El, and it's partnering Synagogues, opened a Union County HaMakom (the place) for all Jewish teens emphasizing joyous and engaged learning.

Who are the partnering Congregations?

Many of the local Union County Reform and Conservative Temples are participating in the program including: Temple Beth Ahm Yisrael, Temple Beth-El Mekor Chayim, Temple Sha'arey Shalom, Temple Sholom, and Temple Beth O'r Beth Torah.

What is the goal of the program?

The goal of the program is for teens to learn about topics that they are actually interested in rather than us telling them what they should be learning. HaMakom also provides a safe place for teens to meet socially with other Jewish teens (as well as teachers and clergy) who they may not have had the opportunity to meet otherwise.

What kind of classes are offered?

HaMakom teens get to pick from a variety of classes. The year was broken up into mini-mesters, each with a theme:

Mini-mester one: Jewish history. That can be history of comedy, history of stage, fashion, or flat out history.

Mini-mester two: Jewish text which includes Torah, midrash, talmud, art and more.

Mini-mester three: Jewish ethics.

Mini-mester four: Diversity in our community and beyond.

What are examples of classes that are offered?

Jews in Comedy - What Makes Jewish Humor Jewish.

From the Borscht belt to Hollywood, some of the best and most influential comedians have been Jewish. From Mel Brooks to Larry David to Sarah Silverman, we will examine what makes humor quintessentially Jewish.

Stars of David: Jews on Broadway

The lights of Broadway would just not be the same if they weren't illuminating Jewish singers, dancers, and composers. Join us for this look at how Jewish and musical culture intersect.

Israeli History: Growth and Changes

For a young country, a lot has happened! Join Lia, who is visiting from Israel, on a whirlwind tour of where Israel has come from, and where it is going.

American History Through Jewish Eyes

Have you ever wondered what Jewish life was like in colonial times? Did Jews fight in the Civil War - and on which side? Did Jews ever put a man on the moon? Join this class to find out!

Women World Changers

This class will explore the lives and historical contexts of Jewish women who changed the course of history. From religious leaders to educational change makers to philanthropists, these women changed the Jewish world.

History of Reform Judaism

From Berlin to Boston, the Reform Movement has asked questions about how to integrate authentic Judaism with modern living. Join this class to understand the birth and beginnings of this process.

And so much more!

Why should parents enroll their teens in HaMakom?

Parents should enroll their teens because it gives teens the opportunity to experience Jewish learning their own way. While the learning is rich and meaningful to the teens because they get to choose their own classes. In Hebrew, HaMakom translates to the place, and this is the place that a Jewish teenager would want to be. Not only do they get to hang out with other local Jewish teens, but they get to learn about topics that actually interest them.

I'm ready to enroll! How do I know if I am qualified and how do I enroll?

As long as you are members of any of the participating congregations, you are eligible to join! Since learning takes place in mini-mesters, teens can arrange for an easy entry point and without feeling like they are behind in the class. Thank you for being with us for the High Holy Days.

Here are some meaningful moments we shared together:

Before the High Holy Days during the Hebrew month of Elul, the clergy dressed the Torahs and reflected on what a year it has been and the sweetness of what was to come.







We opened Rosh Hashanah with the Kulanu service, which was a beautiful and interactive intergenerational worship experience for families with children in grades 2-7. We were lucky it was such a beautiful day so our families could worship from the tent.





We then moved to the main Sanctuary service. Thanks to the hard work of Mike Kenny and the custodial staff, the seats were spread out and sectioned off so everyone could maintain proper social distancing and feel safe. Here is a peek inside the Sanctuary as congregants began to enter.





This year, we needed to think creatively about how we could add an additional worship location for those who still wanted to be connected to the Temple without having to be inside. This is where the idea of the Simulcast Service started. We turned our tents into a prayerful space where we worshiped together, and were able to watch the Sanctuary Service live. Those who attended the Simulcast services got their own Shofar blasts and visits from the clergy so everyone felt connected.

We celebrated the installation of Cantor Ilana Goldman as the Assistant Cantor of Temple Emanu-El of Westfield on Friday, October 22. The Temple Emanu-El community has been incredibly impressed by Ilana's joy, ability to connect with congregants of different ages and spiritual needs, wisdom, and warmth. Ilana fills the sanctuary with beautiful music on Shabbat and holidays, inspires young children to sing in the youth choir, brings energy and love to our preschool families, and guides our b'nai mitzvah students and families with compassion and support.

Cantor Goldman spent her senior year of high school at Interlochen Arts Academy in MI and continued her education at Lawrence University in Appleton, WI where she majored in music and religious studies with a minor in psychology. She received her Masters of Sacred Music and was ordained from Hebrew Union College - Jewish Institute of Religion. During her time in cantorial school, she had the privilege of holding several student pulpits at diverse congregations including Temple Micah in Washington D.C, Vassar Temple in Poughkeepsie, Scarsdale Synagogue and East End Temple in NY. She especially values her training as a chaplain intern at Bellevue Hospital where she completed two units of Clinical Pastoral Education bringing music, prayer and comfort to patients during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The installation service consisted of music, blessings, and songs from the clergy of Temple Emanu-El: Rabbi Ethan Prosnit - Senior Rabbi, Cantor Martha Novick - Senior Cantor, and Rabbi Victor Appell – Associate Rabbi.
